Didja Know? Veyst Vos?

Rosh Hashanah was not the original Jewish new year. There were four different new years, including the new year of the trees, the new year for animals, the new year for kings (which was at Rosh Hashanah), and the new vear of the year, which was at Pesakh. The fall new year is important for farmers, since this is when the rain comes. The spring new year was important for herders, since this is when the lambs are born. As the Israelites became farmers rather than herders, the fall new year attained more importance and became the religious new year during the priestly period, although Nisan the month of Pesach, remains the first month of the year. Yes, that's right. Our new year starts on the first day of the seventh month. Go figure.



This Month in Jewish History

In August, 1861, the Army abolished flogging following the Navy, which abolished flogging in August of 1850 largely due to the efforts of the Jewish Captain Uriah P. Levy.

The 26th of Elul, which comes in late September this year, marks the anniversary of the murder of 11 Israeli athletes at the Olympic Village in Munich. A popular movie was made about the Israeli agents who hunted down the perpetrators. Much was made in the movie of the mixed feelings and angst of these agents, but the actual agents who participated in the hunt reported no such mixed feelings at all.
