Message from the President

The API scores came out this month. For those of you who are unaware, these are the scores that each school gets based on how their students do on the state testing each spring. These scores are used as a way to give a number that expresses how good the school is. They affect funding, housing prices, and the very education that goes on in the school.

Here's how: If the scores are good, real estate agents and city officials advertise the scores and the district or school becomes more popular, making housing in higher demand causing prices to go up. Then, of course the school will get more revenue because the property taxes are higher. Schools with high API scores are eligible for more grants than schools with lower API scores.

If the scores are too low, the school could face state takeover. When this occurs, the school goes into "Program Improvement" or PI and drastic measures may be taken. Large numbers of teachers or administrators may be fired. The school may be restructured in a way that cuts out all electives leaving the entire day working on Language Arts (Reading/Writing) and Math.

So, do these scores really tell us the quality of the school? Are there no other factors in the population of a school that affect test scores? Does a poor score really mean that the teachers and administrators are doing a bad job? Does a high score really mean they are doing a good job?

I will likely continue this topic in other newsletters. I welcome your feedback.

Several of us had particular knowledge to share about certain propositions, which was helpful in helping those of us with less understanding of any specific one. The most difference of opinion surrounded Prop. 37, GMO-modification labeling, but nobody considered the issue crucial enough to try to persuade others any further than just stating reasons for our opinions.

November 7 is the anniversary of the beginning of the Palmer Raid in1919. The raids, authorized by the Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer and his assistant, J. Edgar Hoover, arrested and held over 10,000 people without trial and deported several hundred including many many Jews. Among those arrested was Emma Goldman.
