Message from the President

There has been a lot of press in Brentwood lately about an incident with a teacher. In a nutshell, the teacher abused a student; the district handled the situation poorly; and it all came out when the family won a lawsuit against the district.

As a teacher, this hurts. It hurts my profession. It hurts my union. I cannot control who becomes a teacher or if one will give teachers a bad name. The district tried to deflect responsibility by saying their hands were tied by the education code, which the "powerful" teacher lobby designed. This particular district is non-union, but the district still basically blamed the union. Fortunately, most of the parents didn't seem to agree with their argument.

Here's the part that frightens me. I don't know what I would have done if I was a teacher at the school. Generally, I give a fellow teacher the benefit of the doubt. If I saw the abuse, I know I would have reported it, but what if I had warning signs before it happened? Would I have tried to intervene before it reached a critical point? Would I have figured it wouldn't go that far? Would I have informed the administration that I felt the teacher might not be suited to be in the classroom? I don't know.
