Message from the President

Why do we charge non-members for events? This question has come up every so often, but I'm not sure that everyone has heard the answer.

To begin with, our budget is small and almost entirely consists of the dues paid by members. Without members, we have no budget and no events at all. One of the benefits of being a member is that you do not have to pay for events.

For our events that take place at the Bothwell Center most people understand that we are renting the space and providing supplies so charging for those events seems normal.

The situations where people question the charge are events that don't actually cost anything to put on, like when we do Culture Chats or Tu B'shvat at a location where we pay our own way in. These events are also appropriate to charge for, because they still have to be planned and they are planned for the benefit of our members.

When we charge for events, we shouldn't think of it as paying for that event as much as helping our organization stay solvent so we can continue to function and provide programs for our members and the community.

The other thing to consider is that the charge is a voluntary donation. We aren't going to force anyone to pay, but I would hope community members would like to support the organization providing the program.

Jewish Culture School students learned about the Spanish Inquisition and the Expulsion from Spain. They found out that there were several Jews who became pirates or privateers preying on Spanish ships to avenge the Inquisition. We made hardtack, which the pirates ate, and it was what we call "a pickle" after the terrible pickles we made several years ago. A "pickle" is a massively failed cooking project. Thank you, Ella, for coining this term! We also discussed reasons Jews might stay in Spain and convert and reasons they might leave. The students considered the dangers of the journey, the loss of a homeland where their ancestors had lived for over 400 years, the dangers of staying, the having to relinquish a heritage, and the feeling of living under an oppressive regime. The students were split 50/50 about whether they, in that situation, would stay or leave. When we changed the place and time to America now, however, they almost universally chose to leave. Interesting difference! What would you do?

March 23 is the birthday of Erich Fromm, Jewish Humanist philosopher and co-founder with Martin Buber and Franz Rosenzweig of the Free JewishHouse of Learning in Frankfort. His most famous works are *Escape from Freedom* and *The Art of Loving*.

April 20, 1657 marks the date Jews were granted burgher rights (citizenship) in New Amsterdam, three years after the arrival of 23 Jews fleeing the Inquisition in Brazil.
