

The author states that the new mission of the Jewish people is to lead the world out of theism and into secularism. In other words, we gave the world monotheism and we should take it away.


We should replace it with rationality and intellectual honesty.

Book Review: Marrying Out: Jewish Men, Intermarriage and Fatherhood I had the pleasure of sitting on a panel with Keren McGinity at the recent colloquium of the International Institute for Secular Humanistic Judaism. She has recently published a follow-up book to her 2009 work Still Jewish: A History of Women and Intermarriage in America (New York University Press). The new book is Marrying Out: Jewish Men, Intermarriage and Fatherhood just published this year by Indiana University Press. I found it interesting that in the first work she described three famous Jewish women who married non-Jews in the early years of the twentieth century as politically and socially active rather than Jewishly active, but in her recent book describes men who married non-Jews as politically and socially active as a manifestation of their Jewishness. I asked her about this and she explained that that it was a matter of self-description. The Jewish women did not see their activities as manifestations of their Jewishness, although it may seem to us entirely obvious that their ethical and political views and activities were informed by their Jewish heritages. The men she talked about were interviewed in this century and they, themselves, described their social and political activities as specifically influenced by their Jewish identities. Both books are composed of stories; they are quickish reads and really interesting.
