Hiking in Danville: Sunday, September 20, 10 am, Sycamore Valley Short Ridge. 2 mile, 1 hour. 2101 Holbrook Drive Danville. The Short Ridge Preserve is located within a region of rolling hills and valleys south of Mt. Diablo. This habitat supports gopher snakes, racers, Northern Pacific rattlesnakes, acorn woodpeckers, scrub jays, black-tailed titmouse, Western bluebirds, Northern orioles, lazuli buntings and loggerhead shrikes.

BOOK REVIEW The Last Jew, by Noah Gordon

This is an historical novel, which takes place during the time of the Spanish Inquisition, circa 1492. At this time by order of Spanish royalty, Jews were required to leave Spain or convert to Catholicism. Many who refused were killed.

The main character, Yonah, is the 15-year-old son of a famous Jewish silversmith. His father and brother were killed by the inquisitors. He is determined to honor his father's memory by secretly remaining a Jew, thus becoming a Marano.

He wanders throughout Spain learning various jobs and ultimately becomes a respected physician. On his journey he encounters both hostile and sympathetic characters. He is always hiding his Jewish identity while he struggles to solve his family's mysteries.

This book is very entertaining, while giving us a picture of what life was like during this tragic period of Jewish history.


Message from the President
