

First Day of Jewish Culture School August 30th


Jewish Culture School is going online this fall. It's not easy to hold Culture School online. Zoom singing is hilariously impossible, nobody has room for exuberant folk dancing, and cooking together to build community might have to wait. But we have plans! Our youngest and middle classes will be learning about being Jewish at home. Each week, the half-hour zoom classes will include objects that the students will find in their homes. Our oldest class will be studying Jewish life in Eastern Europe through a combination of individual assignments and in-class discussions during our halfhour weekly meeting. All three classes will take aswild-as-possible dance breaks when needed.

Jewish Culture School teaches a Secular and Humanistic way of being Jewish. It is open to students 5-14 and can culminate in a Secular Brit Mitzvah ceremony. immediately recognizable. In addition to being entertaining, the stories are engaging and even (a little) educational.





Book Review Beyond the Shadow of Night By Ray Kingfisher

This is a novel about two boys who grew up on a farm in Ukraine during the time of World War II. They were inseparable. They considered themselves as brothers born of different mothers. Asher was Jewish and Mykhail was gentile. As the years went by Asher's family left the farm to find work in Warsaw. Mychal's family stayed on the farm. But Asher's family was placed in the Jewish ghetto, and was eventually imprisoned in the Treblinka Concentration Camp.

Unbenounced to Asher, Mykhal ended up as a mechanic in the same camp,



working with the Nazis. After the war they were reunited, each not knowing what the other had done during the past several decades. They each had secrets concerning their activities while at the camp.

This is a compelling story and well written. However, as a warning, some of the activities at the concentration camp are quite graphic and difficult to read.
