



Book Review

CASTE The Origins of Our Discontents By Isabel Wilkerson

This book is a historical account of the nature and origins of caste systems. Those covered existed in India, between the Brahmin and the Dalit; the United States, between the blacks and whites, during the slavery and Jim Crow eras; and in Germany between the Jews and Nazis, during the holocaust. It discussed the origins, similarities and differences between the three systems. It covered the psychological and physical residuals of castes, even in modern times.


The author, who is Black, tells of her own experiences with racism in this country, which are remnants of the Southern caste system. It also talked about the experiences of those who tried to escape from the caste into which they were born, with varying degrees of success. She has also traveled to Europe, and India to get background information.

This book is very authoritative and extremely well written. I can understand why it has been on top of the L.A. Times Non Fiction Best Sellers list for several weeks.


The Sound of the Shofar




Applesauce Cake
