No one should have to forego these services just because they cannot afford the cost of transportation. And for those looking for work, many need transportation to job interviews or to their jobs.

This year, our local bus service Wheels has worked with us to create a new "24 hour pass," a very efficient way for our passengers to take an unlimited number of rides during a 24-hour period for \$3.75. 100% of your donations will be used to purchase these passes. There is zero overhead!



BOOK REVIEW FASTER

HOW A JEWISH DRIVER, AN AMERICAN HEIRESS, AND A LEGENDARY CAR BEAT HITLER'S BEST By Neal Bascomb

If you are a fan of classic auto racing (I am not), you will thoroughly enjoy this historical account of the pre-World War II European racing scene. What I found especially interesting was the intense rivalry between the Jewish driver and the German driver.

Since this took place during the time of the rise of Hitler, it tells about how the German driver represented the pride of Germany. The Jewish driver

represented a thorny challenge to Hitler's and Germany's national ego. Also interesting was the heiress' invasion of the male dominated sport of auto racing. Her assertiveness and desire to win regardless of cost would make the modern day women's liberation movement proud.

What I did not find particularly interesting were the detailed descriptions of the mechanics of the racecars. These took up a large part of the book. However, the descriptions of the races and the struggles, both physical and psychological, of the drivers were fascinating.
