Tisha B'Av

August 2, 1492. The date by which all Jews in Spain had to leave the country. OK, maybe it was July 31st – the historical record is not exactly clear, and our calendar-keeping has changed since then. Either way, it was close enough to Tisha B'Av for the event to be associated with the date.

Tisha B'Av is our all-purpose mourning day. The early rabbis assigned all manner of disasters that befell our ancestors to that date, beginning with the destruction of the First Temple in Jerusalem, and then the Second, and the crushing of the Bar Kochba rebellion by the Romans. The expulsions of the Jews from England, France and Spain were assigned to this date, and it also commemorates various destructions of Jewish communities during the Middle Ages and later pogroms. Most recently, the bombing of the AMIA (Jewish community building) in 1994 occurred the day after Tisha B'Av and is remembered on Tisha B'Av.

Are all these dates historically accurate? Probably not. But that's not really why we set this one day aside for mourning. If we had separate days for mourning each tragedy, we'd be fasting in sackcloth and ashes 365 days a year. It was probably one of the wise acts of the rabbis – who were definitely not always wise – to set aside one day for mourning and allowing us the rest of the year to enjoy being Jewish.

TVCJ Board

On July 22nd, the fiscal year 22 TVCJ Board (Brett Mogilefsky, Judy Seid, Jazz Salwen-Grabowski, Jamie Ireland, Rachel Rose-Yang, Jesse Pino, and Rebecca Ireland) met for the first time since the annual meeting, and selected officers. Bret Mogilefsky will reprise his role as board president, and Judy Seid will remain as Treasurer. Jesse Pino will be Corresponding Secretary, and Rebecca Ireland will be the Recording Secretary.

Current TVCJ Mask Policy

Thank you to all who participated in our survey about COVID safety and masking at TVCJ events. The survey revealed that:

- About half of respondents were comfortable with indoor events.
- Three-quarters of respondents wanted everyone masked indoors regardless of vaccination status.
- Only a quarter of respondents were comfortable with masks being optional, even outside.
- A majority of respondents were only comfortable with food if the event is held outdoors or with social distancing.

Our events bring together people from different geographical areas and include many young, unvaccinated, and vulnerable people. Based on the survey results as well as growing concerns over the Delta variant and changing government guidance, the TVCJ Board has decided on the following policies for upcoming events:

- Events will be held outdoors; in poor weather, events will be held virtually.
- All event attendees must wear masks except when eating.
- Family groups will maintain 6' distance while eating.

We will continue to monitor new guidance and trends in the pandemic's progression, and will make changes to these policies as needed.

We look forward to seeing you (outside) soon.


BOOK REVIEW

The Peddler's Grandson

Growing Up Jewish in Mississippi

The author had a perpetual identity crisis throughout his life. His strongly Jewish family immigrated to Jackson, Mississippi from Romania. His was the first Jewish family that most southerners had ever seen.

He was the only Jew in his elementary school class. So early on he knew what it was like to be an outsider. Even during his college years, neither the Christian nor the Jewish fraternities accepted him. He always wanted to be accepted by the Christian community, while not forsaking his Jewish roots. This feeling of otherness followed him in both worlds. To complicate things further, his father and uncle purchased a clothing store that catered to Black people. This did not sit well with the greater white community, especially during the time of the civil rights struggles in the South.

This nonfiction account reads like a novel. It points out the struggles that many Jewish immigrants faced as they tried to navigate the Christian world. I highly recommend it for all. The Peddler's Grandson can be purchased on Amazon by clicking here.
