

New Lehrhaus Courses (Most are Free)


The Lehrhaus Board has decided to make most courses free of charge for the Winter 2022 semester. If you would like to sign up, then log in to newlehrhaus.org

The Jew Store: A Family Memoir By

Are you as shocked by the title as I was? It turns out that there have been very many of these Jew stores all over the South. These are stores owned by Jewish people in small towns where the Jewish owners are the only Jews in town. The author's family owned and operated one of them and this is their true story.

The author's parents emigrated to this town from Russia by way of New York. The big city was too over whelming for the father who was told that there was great opportunity in the South to make a good living. When the family moved to the small

town they had a variety of issues to deal with. First, after the father bought a dry goods store, he had to deal with getting customers. This was complicated by the fact that the population was not always welcoming to the first Jewish people to live there, and their prejudices were abundant. Also, the mother was determined to keep her traditional Jewish ways, while the rest of the family were more inclined to adapt to the ways of the of the town. Furthermore, the daughter falls in love with a Christian boy and eventually the issue of marriage is discussed. Mother wants the family to move back to New York where both children can meet Jewish mates. Family conflict ensues.

These and other issues make the lives of Jews in a small southern Christian town extremely challenging and interesting. .book was very well written, and I would highly recommend it. <u>Click here to find this book on Amazon</u>.
