Jewish Culture School (JCS)

January JCS

Our January Jewish Culture School was so busy! We made an apple cake that the German Jews moving west in the 1840s and 50s might have made; it was delicious! Then we learned what it was like to sew denim, like the material used by Levi Strauss to make blue jeans. (It's hard!) We learned a dance called the Sher, which means "scissors" in yiddish - a sewing dance! - and practiced Hora Aggadati. We sang Di Gedanken Sind Frei and practiced singing Siman Tov u'Mazal Tov in advance of Ira's Brit Mitzvah ceremony this spring. And we talked about why Levi Strauss wouldn't hire Chinese workers in his factories. It turns out that some people then thought the same as some people think even now, that immigrants bring down the wages for everyone. In Jazz's absence, our terrific aides, Colin, Sophia and Rebecca, stepped up and did a fantastic job filling in everywhere they were needed.



February JCS

In February we learned about Jews in the Civil War. Jews might have fought on both sides of the Civil War, but one thing remained the same: hardtack is pretty terrible! While most Jews did not support the South, we talked about how some Jews were able to justify slavery (hint: just because people did

it in the Torah, doesn't make it a good idea), baked some hardtack that really lived up to its name, and sang some freedom songs.





Three Generations of Jewish Women

In honor of Women's History Month in March, here's a story about three generations of Jewish women. My grandmother and grandfather were stalwarts of the Los Angeles Yiddish Culture Club. My grandfather never wanted to be president, but was vice-president for as many maternal years as I remember. My grandmother was on the hospitality committee. Every single Saturday (except during the summer, when it was too hot in the old building that had no air-conditioning) she would go out to get cake and would get to the Culture Club early to help set up for that night's party or speaker or concert. My grandmother was also a Pioneer Woman. They raised money for poor Jews in postwar Europe to move to Israel or the United States or Canada or Cuba or Argentina or South Africa. My grandfather attended meetings where decisions were made.

When I was a child, I attended the Valley Kindershule two afternoons a week and on Saturday mornings. (My paternal grandparents started that shuleh so my aunt would have a place to learn to read and write Yiddish.) My father served as president for a few years. My mother taught and I remember her making tons of phone calls "This is Ethel Seid from the shuleh" she would start. She also helped develop the curriculum. Oh, and she drove us there and back. (She taught elementary school and was home in time to bring us. My father slept late on Saturdays and Sundays, so she took us then, too.) My father attended meetings where decisions were made. Sometimes.

Me, I'm a rabbi. I teach Jewish Culture School and create and lead holiday observances. I write the occasional column and give the occasional talk on Jewish topics to our Tri-Valley Cultural Jews and to other Secular and Humanistic Jewish communities. (Zoom is good!) I coordinate our Philosophers' Cafe. And *I* get to attend the meetings where decisions are made.



BOOK REVIEW

The Adventure of the Peculiar Protocols
By

Nicholas Meyer



It's not often one can call a book about the Kishinev pogrom and the Protocols of the Elders of Zion "charming." But that's exactly how I'd describe The Adventure of the Peculiar Protocols by Nicholas Meyer. Written in the voice of Dr. Watson, and, like all the best historical fiction, including real people and events, this short readable novel describes the adventures of Sherlock Holmes, Watson and other characters, imagined and real (including Chaim Weitzman and Israel Zangwill) involved in debunking the Protocols of the Elders of Zion. The conclusion, however, is less charming, but completely apropos of our own time – the power of a lie to outrun and outweigh the truth.

This February, help us welcome Tikkun: For the Cosmos, the Community, and Ourselves to The Contemporary Jewish Museum (The CJM)—an exhibition featuring works by thirty Bay Area-based contemporary artists reflecting on the Jewish concept of tikkun (Hebrew for "to repair"). The twelfth iteration of The Dorothy Saxe Invitational at The CJM, this exhibition re-examines tikkun as a phenomenon of care and interconnectedness that is grounded in personal action, environmental responsibility, and community, unfixed from its evolving meanings throughout history. Taken together, the works in this exhibition consider how the concept of tikkun can help us look critically both inward and outward, guide us through change, and build resilience for the ongoing work of repair.

The 27th Annual East Bay International Jewish Film Festival

March 12th through March 26th

Check out <u>eastbayjewishfilm.org</u> for ticket information. We are cosponsoring *With No Land*: With first hand testimonies and unique archive footage, the film retells the history of the Jewish Ethiopian community and the efforts made to bring them to Israel.

Operation Solomon brought 15,000 Jews from Ethiopia to Israel in under 24 hours. Hailed as a military operation that few countries could have mastered, the contributions of Ethiopian Jewish activists have remained mostly unknown. This documentary reveals the clandestine and often dangerous activities of the Ethiopian Jews themselves.

Guest Speaker: Yonatan Eyov, an Israeli emissary (shaliach) serving at Stanford University, will share his own story of immigrating to Israel at the age of six from Ethiopia and the present situation facing the Beta Yisrael community.
