

Book Review

Not Our Kind By Kitty Zeldis



This novel set in New York post World War II is about Eleanor, a Jewish college graduate who finds a job as a live-in tutor to a post-polio girl, Margeaux. She and her family live in a very upscale neighborhood that is primarily non-Jewish. In order to fit in better and to avoid religious issues, Eleanor secretly changes her surname from Moskowitz to Moss. While Margeaux becomes very attached to her tutor, the family is very skeptical. But since the girl has had difficulties with other tutors the parents let her stay and live in the guesthouse.

We find out later that the father is an alcoholic womanizer. The mother tolerates this, as she fears what neighbors and friends would think and say if they knew. Also, the mother's brother comes to live with the family and becomes romantically involved with Eleanor. When Eleanor goes to spend time with the family at their vacation home we find that sexism and anti-Semitism rear their ugly heads.

All the characters in this book are forced to make a variety of life altering decisions thus making them quite interesting. I feel that the book for the most part is well written, but at times has the feel of a soap opera. Click here to purchase this book on Amazon.

This week marks the 48th anniversary of the founding convention for the Coalition of Labor Union Women (CLUW), formed to help women become union leaders and give their issues greater weight during contract talks.

The presiding officer at the event, which attracted more than 3,000 women from 82 unions, was Myra Komoroff Wolfgang (May 1914 – April 1976), one of the nation's first women union organizers and the subject of this week's episode of Coming of Age: Detroit, the award winning digital series from Silver Screen Studios and Reboot.

A labor leader and women's rights activist in Detroit from the 1930s through the 1970s, Wolfgang advocated for the working poor and for women in the workforce.
