# "Justice, Justice, Shall You Pursue": A Call to Action for the TVCJ Community

As Jews, we have known oppression. Knowing our history and present, how can we ethically turn a blind eye to the hate and oppression faced by the various communities in the U.S. today? "Don't say gay" laws, anti-trans laws, anti-abortion decisions, white supremacists preventing progress, mass shootings, and state-sanctioned violence are all too prevalent in our current society. Even with Pride celebrations, climate strikes, Black Lives Matter protests, and vigils, it is still too easy for our politicians and leaders to sweep the intertwining systemic issues at the root of all these oppressive fights under the rug.

As Jews, we say: no more. We call on our senators, representatives and state and local officials to stand up to these horrific acts of violence not with "thoughts and prayers" or speeches, but through real action:

The <u>Religious Action Center (RAC)</u> is the Reform movement's social action center. It is aligned with TVCJ's and our Secular and Humanistic Jewish movement's progressive values and ethics. They've made it possible for you to <u>read about these issues and use the links provided</u> at the bottom of each page to contact your Senators and Representatives to make sure they know that we Jews believe concrete action must be taken to ensure justice and liberty across our country, for all.

You can also call your Senators and Representatives directly regarding other issues using the member lookup provided via <u>congress.gov</u> and via <u>ca.gov</u>.



#### A Message From the Rabbi

By the time you read this, the Supreme Court ruling on reproductive rights will have been made public. We are in a time of decreasing rights over our bodies. Abortion and contraception, marriage equality ("racial" and gender based), and LGBTQ+ rights are all under attack. It is tempting to despair or to comfort ourselves by thinking these terrible oppressions can never affect us: we live in California, we have means. Neither of those responses is reasonable. Our obligation as Jews and human beings is to stand for the rights of everyone. What can you do besides shout your outrage (which you should also definitely do)? Here's one practical thing you can do today: donate to an abortion access fund. The DC Abortion Fund dcabortionfund.org helps pay for people all over the country to come to DC for abortions that aren't legal in other states. The Texas Equal Access Fund teafund.org helps find and fund abortion access and provides emotional support networks. Medical Students for Choice msfc.org provides abortion training and family planning education to medical students whose medical schools do not provide this training. Don't give up. Don't despair. But also,

don't fail to do something. In the words of our famous Partisan Hymn - our marching steps will be a drumbeat; we are here!

Next week, the National Council of Jewish Woman will hold a briefing for the Jewish community with NCJW President Dana Gershon, our partners at Center for Reproductive Rights, who litigated the Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization case and with Physicians for Reproductive Health. We'll break down exactly what today's decision means for our country, for people seeking access to abortion care, and lay out NCJW's plan for the months ahead. We

hope you'll join us.

On July 14th at 10:30am PT: Rabbi Danya Ruttenberg will lead an in-depth teaching on Jewish sources around abortion justice over Zoom.

And finally, we know that today, and in the days to come, many will panic to determine where and how to find abortion care. It's challenging already, but it's about to be insurmountable for many — especially women, people of color, LGBTQ individuals, and those with disabilities in states that will overturn abortion access.

That's why NCJW created the Jewish Fund for Abortion Access in partnership with the National Abortion Federation (NAF) last month, to directly support real people who need abortions by connecting them with money they need to access care. Kiss & Tell by Alain de Botton. Philosophy disguised as a novel disguised as biography.

<u>The Seventh Handmaiden</u> by Judith M. Pransky. A story about a girl enslaved to Queen Esther of the Purim story.

Holes by Louis Sachar. A story about a child in a correctional camp and the how the past and present

interact.

Renegades by Marissa Meyer. A story about good and evil and how superpowers can be used.

<u>A Deadly Education</u> by Naomi Novik. What happens when everything is transactional. And also magic.

<u>The Future is Yours</u> by Dan Frey. A story about a computer that can tell the future, and what happens when you know it.

Atomic Habits by James Clear. Small ways to make big changes in your life.

<u>The Expanse</u> (series) by James S. A. Corey (really Daniel Abraham and Ty Franck). Humans have colonized the solar system and created distinct societies in different places. Later in the series, humans gain access to other worlds.

<u>Just Pursuit</u> by Laura Coates. A readable, edifying and horrifying set of accounts of real encounters with the criminal justice system by a former federal prosecutor.

<u>The Hidden Palace</u> by Helene Wecker. Sequel to 1920s magical realism pairing of a genie and a golem shows the costs of obsession and the possibility of non-romantic love between lifelong friends.


<u>Religion for Atheists</u> by Alain de Botton. This Secular Jewish author calls for atheists to create communities that provide what religious communities provide to believers.
