This Month in Jewish History

In November of 1210, King John began imprisoning the Jews in England. John was the king because the actual king, Richard the Lionhearted, was on Crusade. While fighting for Jerusalem, Richard tried to hire away Saladin's medical advisor, but was unsuccessful. The doctor in question? Maimonides! Maimonides is known as the author of abstruse influential Jewish texts such as The Guide of the Perplexed. His doctoring was not quite so robust - for example, he was a proponent of elephant dung as a medicine. He was also known for his dedication to work, both rabbinic and medical, often working late into the night and neglecting his family to do so.

Action alert! Today's top actions

The issue: An application for the first-ever overthe-counter (OTC) birth control pill was filed with the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in June.

The good news: The FDA announced an advisory committee will meet on November 18th to review the application. This meeting is a key step in the FDA's regulatory process and an important opportunity for public testimony emphasizing the strong evidence and broad support for OTC birth control pills for people of all ages.

resources they need to plan their futures, including the birth control method of their choice, free from barriers or stigma. Submissions must be received by November 3.

The issue: The right for LGBTQ+ individuals to marry who they love was a hard-fought battle but is under threat: Justice Thomas's concurring opinion in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* urged the court to reconsider *Obergefell v. Hodges* — the case that secured the right to same-sex marriage.

The good news: The Respect for Marriage Act would require the federal government to recognize the validity of same-sex and interracial marriages. The bill has already passed in the House with bipartisan support and is now being considered in the Senate.

Your task: Send an email to urge your Senators to pass the Respect for Marriage Act and ensure the continued right to same-sex and interracial marriage.

The issue: After the January 6th, 2021 insurrection on the capital, the Senate must clearly define and modernize the electoral count process to mitigate future abuse of power.

The good news: The Electoral Count Reform and Presidential Transition Improvement Act of 2022 modernizes and clarifies the process of certifying the presidential election, and a version was passed by the House on September 21st, 2022.

Your task: Send an email to your Senators, demanding they pass this act and continue to advocate for meaningful voting rights reform.


Our Sukkah Raising



BOOK REVIEW THE BOOK OF LOST NAMES BY Kristin Harmel





This is a book of historical fiction that takes place in France during World War 2. The main characters are Eva and Remy. They were both forgers who developed thousands of fake documents so that Jewish children could escape the Nazis.

Eva decided that while they gave the children phony names to put on their documents, they needed to have their real names recorded somewhere so that hopefully some day they could be reunited with their parents. These names were placed in the pages of an ancient religious book with the aide of a secret code that they developed. The book was housed in the library of the church in which they secretly did their work. Hence, the Book of Lost Names.

Eva and Remy fell in love, this love affair was not without obstacles. The most challenging of which was that Eva's mother was opposed to it on the grounds that she wanted Eva to marry a Jewish boy. She felt that marriage to a non-Jew would mean that she would be abandoning her family as well as her community, which was already in grave danger. The mother got her way when Eva and Remy were separated by the demands of the Jewish resistance movement in which they served. Each presumed the other was murdered by the Nazis.

This is a story of individuals who exhibited amazing courage in the face of extreme danger. It also told not only of the great and undying love Eva and Remy had for each other, but also of their devotion to the

tasks which saved countless Jewish lives. The book was extremely well written and was a real page - turner. I would most highly recommend it.
