This month in Jewish history:

January 14, 1858 is the birthday of Hannah Solomon, founder of the National Council of Jewish Women. Her mother founded Chicago's Jewish Ladies Sewing Society, making clothing for people who couldn't afford it and her father was a founder of the Zion Literary Society, a book discussion group for young people.

In 1893, Hannah was approached to support the Jewish Denominational Congress assembled for the World Fair. She said the women would join if they could be active members, not just supporters. When the men denied women equal participation, Hannah organized a separate women's congress, the NCJW. In its early years, the NCJW supported settlement houses and free clinics, and advocated for children in court.

Today, the NCJW is a leading voice for reproductive rights, voting rights, and immigrant and refugee support. You can read more at ncjw.org.








Book Review

A Memoir on the Power of Friendship

But most significant for this book is her life-long and extremely close friendship with Ruth Bader Ginsberg-before and after she became supreme court Justice. Nina Totenberg, along, with her husband and other close personal friends formed a great support group for each other through the good times as well as the tragic times. Their favorite activities when they got together involved sharing meals-hence the title.

Their devotion to each other was extreme. The strength and power of RBG was evident even when she was battling cancer. She never let it interfere with her work or with her dinners with Nina and the group. What an inspiration she was to millions of people both in this country and

abroad.
