Passover Seder 4/27/24






Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

April 4th is a Jewish holiday. It's the yortseit (death anniversary) of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. who was assassinated on that date in 1968. Martin Luther King, Jr. was an activist not only on behalf of the civil rights movement, but was also an activist for peace and for workers' rights. He was in Memphis that day to support striking sanitation workers. On April 4th, we remember that Jews and Black Americans marched together in support of all those causes, and that there can be no civil rights, workers' rights or peace alone - each supports and strengthens the others. In the words of the Mishnah, "the more justice, the more peace."

BOOK REVIEW THE CURIOUS KIDNAPPING OF NORA W. AGE of 122 By Cate Green



This novel is about Nora W. who is a holocaust survivor who lives to the ripe old age of 122. That makes her the oldest person alive. To celebrate this her large family, consisting of children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, etc. want to throw her a huge birthday party along with representatives from the Book of World Records. She is not interested. Her main interests consist of spending time with her great-grandchildren and indulging in her favorite foods, like schmalz herring and vodka. That is, until one of her grandsons teaches her how to play poker for money on her new computer.

A mystery ensues when large amounts of her money go missing from her saving accounts. A drama occurs when her favorite granddaughter has an accident and goes into a coma. It is not known if she will regain consciousness. These events throw the family into disarray. Meanwhile, Nora and her caregiver go to London to relive her past. Secrets are discovered.

The book is divided up into the days prior to the party. You never know whether the party will ever really take place. The book contains humor, drama, mystery and Yiddishkeit. I loved every
