TVCJ Statement

As Jews and as Americans, we decry the Trump/Musk administration's attempts to deport a green card holder for expressing opinions opposed to the current government's. As Americans, we support the rights of everyone to speak peaceably about controversial subjects without fear of retribution. As Jews, we know that the oppression of anyone means that society isn't safe for Jews. We further demand that the administration stop using supposed anti-Semitism as a reason for punishing their opposition. Jews will not be used as an excuse for unAmerican and anti-Constitutional government actions.

Why Do We Need a Home?

As you know, we are trying to meet a matching grant of \$20,000 to help us find permanent rental space for our supplies, library and activities. Why can't we continue as we are, though?

To start with, our supplies are scattered - we fill an enormous cabinet at the Bothwell Center (although the Center is no longer available for our events), a 6 foot high bookcase and another bookcase shelf, a garage cabinet and some floor space at Judy's house, as well as space in Jazz's garage. Every time we have an event, a gathering or a holiday, we have to make the rounds searching for what we need. If we had dedicated space, we could keep track of what we have and it would be easily available.

The second reason is that we need space for our gatherings. Homes are not always available, accessible or the right size/configuration. We also need space for our school. While it is nice to have the kitchen in a home,

there's no way to separate classes so there's sometimes a little more noise than is optimal.

How can you help? Make a donation of any size to our "We Need a Home Fund." We're hoping to be halfway to our \$20,000 goal by June.



TVCJ Hike Saturday - 5/03/25 9:30a.m.

Meet at the East parking lot (no fee) at 9:30a.m. Walk about 2 miles out (466ft elevation gain) loop back 2 miles. Total trail is 14.6 miles so we can go further if we want. Deep in a valley framed by oak-covered hills, Del Valle Lake is five miles long surrounded by 4,395 acres of beautiful land for hiking, horseback riding, and nature study. Exposed, but shouldn't be too hot in early May. Bring plenty of water.



Directions to Arroyo Road Staging Area

From I-580 in Livermore, exit at North Livermore Avenue. Drive south on North Livermore Avenue. Turn right at Portola Avenue, then left on North L Street. North L Street becomes South L Street, then Arroyo Road. Continue on Arroyo Road past the entrance to the U.S. Veterans

Administration Hospital and Sycamore Grove Park. The staging area is on the left at the end of Arroyo Road (No parking fee).

Alternatively, take Holmes St. in Livermore to Wetmore Rd. Continue past Sycamore Grove entrance to Arroyo Road. Turn right and proceed as above.

Reproductive Rights Program





The Golem of Brooklyn

The Golem of Brooklyn by Adam Mansbach is a quick course on Jewish history and culture cleverly hidden in a hilarious - maybe even rollicking -

story set in Brooklyn, upstate New York and Kentucky. A cultural Jew and a OTD (ex-Hassidic devotee) set out with The Golem to fulfill the mission of all the golems (there's really only one) in all of Jewish history and folklore - to protect the Jews against those who seek to kill and oppress them. TLDR - The Golem comes through.

A little Yiddish is helpful, but if there's anything you don't understand, call me and I'll translate. (I actually had to look up a word or two, one of which is "pus," which is not a word I have ever needed to use in Yiddish.)
