

Location: Castro Valley




The program is designed for adults but is family-friendly—kids are absolutely welcome.

Some intriguing books were mentioned. Here's a list of titles that might interest you:

- -All the Colors of the Dark, Chris Whitaker: A murder mystery, to say more would spoil the surprise.
- -Nathan Hale's *Hazardous Tales Series:* A collection of graphic novels that explore historical events in a humorous and accessible way.
- -An Unfinished Life: John F. Kennedy, 1917 1963, Robert Dallek: A deeper dive into the inner life of our 35th president.

- -Finnegan's Wake, James Joyce: A classic that needs to be read aloud.
- *-The Rose Code*, Kate Quinn: The women of Bletchley Park come alive in this historical fiction.
- -A Woman of No Importance, Sonia Purnell: A tale of an American spy who helped the Allies win WWII.
- *-Piranesi*, Suzanna Clarke: A mysterious novel narrated by someone named Piranesi, that touches on ideas of identity.
- -Bad Law, Ten Popular Laws that are Ruining America, Elie Mystal: A breakdown of 10 pieces of legislation that perpetuate injustice.
- -Allow Me To Retort: A Black Guy's Guide to the Constitution, Elie Mystal: A discussion of what rights we have in the US and how to preserve them.
- -A Half Built Garden, Ruthanna Emrys: A hopeful novel that combines climate change fiction and first contact story.
- -Gamechanger: The Bounceback, L.X. Beckett: A hopeful coming of age novel in the wake of a global disaster.

Our TED-style talks were quite fascinating. To take a deeper dive, here's a summary of the topics we covered:

- -Al and it's impact on society
- -The mind-blowing Leaf Sheep (a species of sea slug)
- -Nutrition for a longer, healthier life, and how to load your plate
- -The art of the kvetch

We're also so glad to have met Lily and Andy, who jumped in to help at the table and made everyone who stopped by feel welcome.


It was a great day, and it wouldn't have happened without all of you. Thanks for showing up and showing what community looks like.

BOOK REVIEW

THE POSTCARD
BY
ANNE BEREST



This historical novel takes place in France in the years before World War II. It starts in the 1930s and goes to the present day. The main characters are a Jewish family consisting of a mother, a father, and a daughter and a son, who are in their teen years. They are doing well until the Nazis occupy the country and arrest all of them. The children are released but the adults are held and killed in a concentration camp. One day the children, who are living with other family members, get a postcard with nothing on it except for the grandparents and children's first names. Nobody knows who sent it or why it was sent to them.

The oldest daughter, Myriam, undertakes a years long investigation to try to get information of who sent the postcard. Also, to try to learn more about her grandparents and other members of the family. She learns that no matter how successful they are in their lives, they are considered outsiders in France due to their Jewish backgrounds. Myriam's search brings her to many cities and villages in France as well as to a number of concentration

camps. At first, very little information is obtainable. But then, finally a breakthrough.

The novel discusses the lives and relationships of many family members of different generations. It reads like a mystery novel, as well as a character study. I found it hard to put down, and I would highly recommend it.

SAN FRANCISCO | JEIVISH FILIN JULY 17 -AUG 3 SFJFF.ORG

The 45th San Francisco Jewish Film Festival (SFJFF), presented by the Jewish Film Institute, is taking place from July 17th to August 3rd, 2025. The festival will showcase more than 65 independent films across San Francisco and the East Bay, celebrating the diversity and joy of Jewish identity, culture, and history. The event is the largest and longest-running independent Jewish film festival globally, dedicated to presenting bold films and filmmakers that explore and expand the Jewish narrative.

Some highlights of the festival include:

Opening Night: The Sundance award-winning documentary, *Coexistence, My* Ass!, which follows Israeli comedian Noam Shuster-Eliassi as she navigates the complexities of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict through comedy and political satire. Shuster-Eliassi will also perform a live comedy show during the festival's first weekend.

Freedom of Expression Award: Presented to Oakland native, actor, rapper, and singer-songwriter Daveed Diggs for his genre-defying work exploring identity, justice, and imagination. His latest film, *Magic Hour*, will also be screened.

Centerpiece Narrative: The film *Fantasy Life*, which features a laid-off paralegal who falls for the mother of the children he's nannying, co-starring Amanda Peet and Judd Hirsch.

Centerpiece Documentary: *Holding Liat*, a documentary that follows a family's struggle to secure the release of their daughter, Liat, who was taken hostage by Hamas during the October 7th attacks, while also exploring the complexities and human cost of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Next Wave Spotlight: The dark romantic comedy *Oh, Hi!*, about a couple's unexpected and unhinged first romantic getaway.

Closing Night: The summer camp comedy *The Floaters*, featuring a struggling musician who takes a job at a Jewish summer camp for misfits.

A Retrospective: Celebrating 45 years of SFJFF, this event features guest speakers and rare film clips from the festival's history.

45th Anniversary Town Hall: A community gathering to discuss and contribute to the Jewish Film Institute's vision for the future. Click here for information on the town hall.

The festival also includes a diverse range of films exploring various themes, including:

LGBTQ+ Stories: With several feature films addressing LGBTQ+ themes and histories, reports the *Bay Area Reporter*. The festival will also feature a reading by non-binary, transgender lesbian actor Tommy Dorfman.

Arts & Culture: Including films profiling artists like Meredith Monk and Paddy Chayefsky.

Holocaust & Post-Holocaust: Films that delve into the history and memory of the Holocaust and its aftermath.

Israel & Palestine: Exploring the complex relationship and narratives surrounding these regions.

Social Justice: With films like *Disposable Humanity* investigating the Nazi Aktion T4 program and *Death & Taxes* examining wealth inequality.
