### **Our Movie Night**



BOOK REVIEW

THE LIBRARIAN OF AUSCHWITZ

This is the true story of Dita Kraus. She was a prisoner of the Auschwitz Concentration Camp. Because she could read, one of the leaders of the prisoners, Fredy Hirsch, gifted her with 8 volumes of banned books that she promised to care for. Anyone caught with books in the camp could be put to death. Because she took this task very seriously, she became known as the Librarian of Auschwitz, even at the tender age of 14.

She dug an underground hiding place for the books, called her "hidey hole." Only a few trusted prisoners knew where this was. They were lent out individually and very cautiously. The books became very precious to the prisoners because they felt it connected them to the outside world. Because most of the consumers of these books were children, the books had to be read to them—also a crime. People in and out of the camp asked Dita why she bothered to introduce these books to the children, since many would not live a very long life. She replied that her purpose was to provide them with as normal experience as possible, thus giving them hope.

Dita, as well as her co-conspirators were true profiles in courage. They had many close encounters with Nazi officers-including Dr. Joseph Mengele, who Dita felt was always watching her in case she did anything suspicious. She did not.

This book was very well written. In many ways it read like a novel instead of a memoir.

**Reviewer's note:** I wrote this review with great trepidation. This is because the book contains a number of graphic descriptions of the horrible life in the concentration camps. These scenarios were difficult to read and are not for everyone. Readers beware.
