#### **Exploring the Stories of Refugees**


This week at Jewish Culture School we explored the question "who are refugees?" through stories, food and music that explored these themes of welcoming strangers and resilience.

We read the beautiful book *Shoham's Bangle*, by Sarah Sasson, discovering the rich culture of Iraqi Jews. The kids loved cooking (and eating!) Syrian red lentil soup, and watching an inspiring JDC (American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee) video about Sasha, a Ukrainian Jewish child building a new life in Poland.

We learned the song "Follow the Drinking Gourd", exploring how music has guided people toward freedom throughout history. It was a meaningful, lively morning filled with stories, cooking, music, and cultural discovery--exactly the kind of learning that makes our community so special!

The Boy on the Wooden Box
A Memoir

# By Leon Leyson with Marilyn J. Harran and Elisabeth B. Leyson



This memoir takes place in Poland prior to World War II. Until Leon was 9 years old, he and his family lived in the village of Narewka. After several months they moved to Krakow where they enjoyed the big city middle class life style.

In 1939, when the Nazis invaded Poland, Leon and his family's lives turned upside down. Their rights as Jews were taken away, and among other things, he could not go to school, and his father was not permitted to work. However, all at once, the family's fortune changed again when the father was hired by Oskar Schindler. Schindler was impressed by the father's work skills at his factory. Eventually, he also became impressed by the Leon's interest and mechanical skills, though he needed to stand on a box to reach the controls. He didn't know it then but these eventually saved their lives, since Schindler was allowed to save his workers from extermination at the death camps.

This memoir tells a story of amazing perseverance and courage amidst horrible conditions and death. All of this is told through the eyes of a teenager and his family. It was memorialized in the movie, *Schindler's List*.
