2. Where are you from? I've lived in Livermore for almost my entire life, but was born in New Mexico.

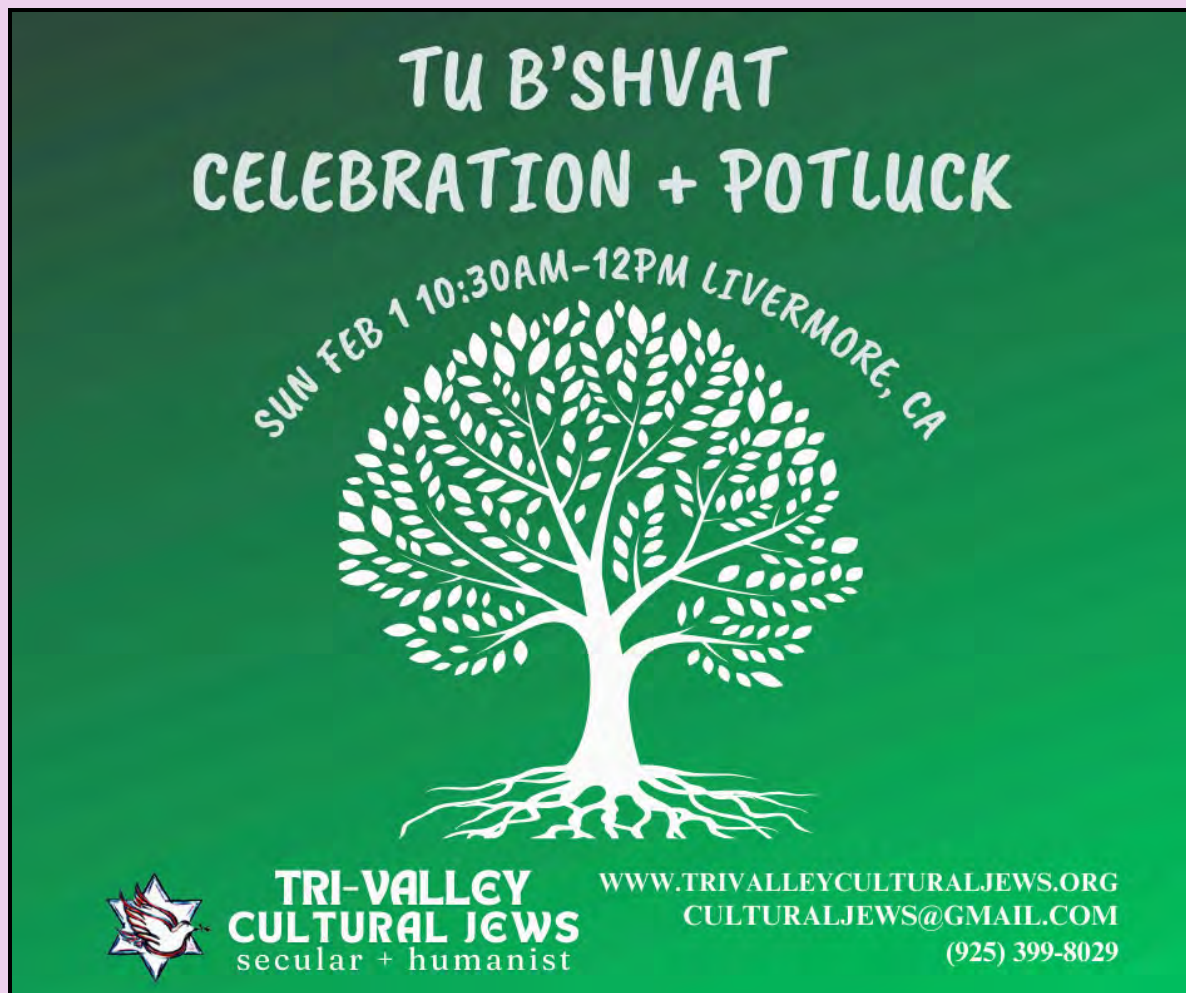

At our Jewish Culture School class this month we explored the long history of Jews in the civil rights movement and what it looks like to stand up against racism in meaningful ways. To honor this legacy, we made black-eyed pea hummus--a delicious blend of a traditional Black Southern food and a Middle Eastern staple.

Students also took part in a relay race with different "handicaps" to experience what happens when the playing field isn't equitable, followed by thoughtful discussion. We learned about Jewish civil rights heroes and how their actions reflect core Jewish values: equality, diversity, welcoming the stranger, and caring for the earth.

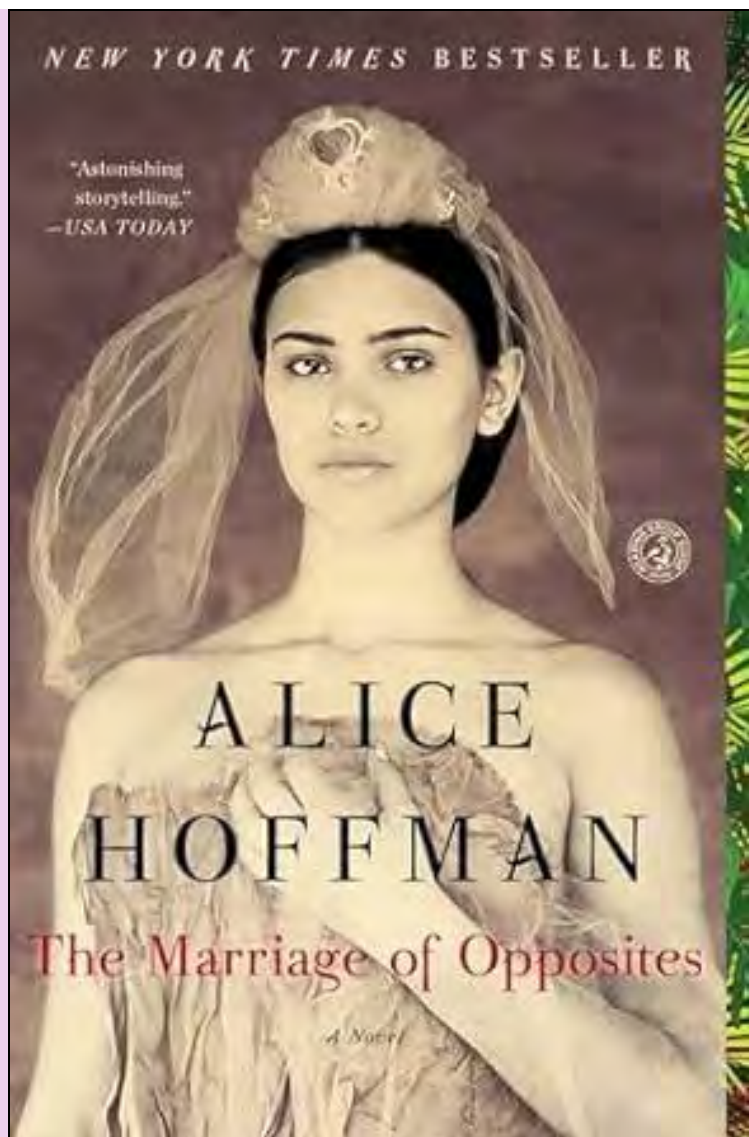

BOOK REVIEW
THE MARRIAGE OF OPPOSITES

Alice Hoffman



This novel takes place on the beautiful island of St. Thomas in the middle 1830s. This has become the home of a tight knit group of Maranos who have been expelled from France for the crime of being Jewish. The matriarch of the family tries to keep it intact, but her daughter is intent on living by her own rules.

The father has a successful business that has come upon hard times. The daughter, Rachel is expected to marry a widower that has three children in order to save the business, which she reluctantly does. All goes well until he dies. After a short time his nephew comes to town to manage the estate. He and Rachel have a rocky relationship at first but are forced to work it out.

Another interesting aspect of the story is that Rachel's younger brother has become an artistic prodigy whose sole interest in life is to practice his art. Mother is unhappy about this because she wants him to abandon his art in order to run the family business.

As can be seen, this story has much conflict and drama. It is well written and I would recommend it.
